

Gaiety and menace in *A London Symphony*

With Westminster Chimes faintly heard, the misty River Thames brings London to life for a new day. London street cries, the bustle of Hampstead Heath on a bank holiday, and the wheeze of mouth organ and accordion draw us into the bustle and energy of the great city.

Yet there is more to this music than a picture: there is a profound conflict between primal forces of life and death; or, at least, light and darkness. Written on the eve of the First World War, did its composer sense what was to come?

The orchestra now draws on the full panoply of wind, brass, and percussion to play three sumptuous scores by two of our greatest English composers.
